Haakon's Bar Mitzvah

A very important date is Saturday, January 18th. Haakon Magnus Wendt will become Bar Mitzvah and be called to the Torah on Shabbat Yitro. Rabbi Irit Shillor will lead services with Haakon at her side. The proud parents and siblings invite everyone to share this special day with Haakon. Haakon has worked hard preparing for his Bar Mitzvah service and we, as his congregation want to celebrate with him. Haakon is the fourth and youngest child of the Wendt family, his older siblings all having celebrated Bar or Bat Mitzvah in our synagogue with our Rabbi. Please mark the date and enjoy the day with Haakon.

Jewish January

We are pleased that Rabbi Shillor will celebrate Tu BiShvat with us this year. Please join us on January 17th as we celebrate our annual congregational Tu BiShvat Seder, the "New Year of the Trees." Our Seder celebrates the "first fruits," and we will taste fruits and nuts, juices and wine together as we recall this beautiful tradition, which has its origins in the 16th century. We have celebrated this holiday together since we established our congregation in 1997. The Torah teaches us that we are akin to a "tree in the field" held by our roots and yearning toward the heavens. We seek to understand our relationship with God and its meaning. Similar to a tree, we hope our lives leave something of value behind. A tree is a sign of life and hope, and it is our hope that a peaceful solution can be found in Israel and that peace and security will reign within its borders.

January 27th is international Holocaust Remembrance Day and recalls the Liberation of the concentration camp in Auschwitz by Soviet troops in 1945. The day of remembrance was instituted in Germany in 1966 by Chancellor Roman Herzog. At 7:00 p.m. the city of Hamelin will remember the victims of the Holocaust with a theatrical reading. Our congregation sponsors this evening along with Hamelin's churches.

New Year's Reception

The congregation will greet the new secular year 2014 with a party and hope many will attend. The party is planned for Sunday, January 5th, beginning at 4:00 p.m. Many members are involved in the planning of the festive day. As always with our celebrations, there will be entertainment and delicious homemade food.

Interreligious Dialogue

The new year will afford us new opportunities to enter into interreligious dialogue with our non-Jewish friends and neighbors. The Interreligious Women's Group has discussed many different topics of shared interests over the past years. This year we have decided to explore the foods we eat, when and why in Islam, Judaism and Christianity. Our first meeting will be held in the Mosque in the Hunoldstrasse as we look at foods eaten in Islam. We'll begin at 5:00 p.m. and hope to meet and greet many new faces. In March we'll meet in our Synagogue and in May in the Lutheran church. It's certain to be tasty!

Our work with the Society of Christians and Jews enters its 17th year. We are proud to be such an active partner in the work we've invested in, creating an atmosphere of respect and trust between the religions, discovering what we share and exploring what separates us. This effort is viable proof of our commitment to Reform Judaism. We'll kick off the year with a podium discussion entitled "Great Rabbis and Christian Saints." Rabbi Adrian Schell and Deacon Hans-Georg Spangenberger will lead the discussion. Join us on January 30th at 7:00 p.m.

Russian Consul

We will once again welcome the Russian Consul in our Synagogue. He will spend several hours with us on January 28th. He is with us to help those members still holding Russian passports. We are happy to assist our members and Russian citizens living in Hamelin in this way.

Youth Group

We're looking forward to Rabbi Adrian's return from Israel. In January he will be back with us and that means the youth group Netzer Hamelin can continue where it left off. Mark your calendars and don't miss a single program that Rabbi Adrian has in store for the kids in the congregation.
