The congregation celebrated with a belated New Year's party on January 5th. Congregational president Rachel Dohme welcomed everyone, emphasizing "how good and important each and every individual in the congregation is and although we are all different, coming from different cultures and religious experiences, we all can contribute our talents for the good of the group." The party commenced with a lively music program of Jewish and Russian music, encouraging everyone to tap their feet or dance. A "kibbitz" with friends and neighbors rounded off the party atmosphere. Hours later, members wandered slowly home in the chilly January night air, warmed by delicious food, good music and conversations. A "second" New Year was celebrated on January 17th, our Tu Bi Shevat Seder, led by our Rabbi Irit Shillor. Every chair around the festive table was occupied, covered with everything required of the Seder, celebrating the "New Year of the Trees." In accordance of the Seder, we tasted different nuts and fruits, drank four cups of wine and fruit juices and recited blessings and read thought-provoking texts. What a lovely festival in our house—"Beitenu"!

International Holocaust Remembrance Day was observed on January 27th. It recalls the day in 1945 when the Red Army liberated the concentration camp Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi extermination camp. Memorial



services for the victims address the emotions and intense pain, especially for Jews throughout the world and those of us living in Germany today.

Beside the city of Hamelin's observance of the day, our congregation was involved in a meaningful and important project with one of the local high schools. The entire tenth grade of Viktoria-Luise-Gymnasium, aware of our congregation's rejection of the so-called "Stolpersteine" (Stumbling blocks) spent the day exploring other forms of honoring and remembrance for the victims of the Shoah. In a hushed auditorium, the day ended with Rachel Dohme lighting a Yahrzeit candle and Faina Pelts chanting the prayer El Male Rachamim.

Bar Mitzvah Haakon Wendt



Haakon was thrilled to see every seat filled in our sanctuary as he was called to the Torah for the first time, becoming the 9th Bnei Mitzvah of our congregation and the second in our new synagogue. This may, to some readers. sound like a small number. If so, take a moment to realize that we have re-created a congregation and Jewish life where it had been absolutely decimated. To us, a small congregation, composed of 90 percent Jews from the FSU, each Bar or Bat Mitzvah is a testimony to the endurance and future of our People and nothing less than a miracle.

Haakon's proud family, friends and congregants all joined him for this joyous day, showering him with a hailstorm of sweets as he finished reading his portion. It was especially poignant that his three siblings, each of them a former Bar or Bar Mitzvah could be in attendance, especially big brother Joshua, who a day later left with his battalion for Kosovo.

Haakon assisted Rabbi Shillor, leading the service. Mom Elke gave an emotional speech to her young son, leaving all with a teary eye. The congregation's choir "Shalom" closed the service with a short program of Yiddish songs. Haakon thanked everyone, and the afternoon was filled with good food and conversation around the Kiddush buffet tables.

In January our congregation took part in two events, both attesting to true tolerance.

The Interreligious Women's Group kicked off the year with the first of three sessions on Food and Religion what we eat, when and why.
