We consciously decided to carry on the religious Reform tradition which was celebrated in Hamelin until the congregation and Jewish life was destroyed in 1938. Our community is steadfast, our synagogue stands and we are indebted and grateful to all those who helped build what we have today.

In our 20th year we will celebrate our past, present and future and hope you will all take part.

# A Message from Rabbi Dr. Ulrike Offenberg

Purim is a time when everything is stood on its head. The Esther story is itself full of sudden changes: Whoever thinks they are on top of the pile is suddenly brought down, whereas those who were down at the bottom find themselves suddenly raised to leadership roles. Our Purim festivity is actually not about celebrating the way in which the Jews of Persia were able to turn the tables on their enemies and to become in effect a mirror-image of them; instead we celebrate the way in which power relationships can change — the weak can change their position in society and do not need to stay always at the bottom.

Our custom of wearing costumes emphasies this issue of changes that are often unexpected but nevertheless possible. It is fun to be someone else for a while, to play with their identity and to laugh about this. The costumes are often comical in themselves and stress this point of sudden changes. More than waving rattles at the mention of Haman's name, it is the act of laughing itself which is liberating, for we know deep down that nothing has to stay forever the way it is. This is also why it is so important to fulfil the Mitzvah of "Matanot LaEvyonim," the "Gifts to the Poor," to enable even those people who are normally treated with contempt or left on the fringes of society to enjoy the festivity, not only in the form of a meal but also to give them the hope that circumstances can change, and the world does not have to stay the way it is.



#### International Women's Day

Please join us for International Women's Day on Wednesday, March 8th at 4:00 p.m. Faina Pelts and Valerij Bogatchyk have prepared a musical program for the day. Everyone is welcome. Everyone will raise their glasses of bubbly and enjoy delicious sweets and the women will receive a spring flower.

The earliest Women's Day observance was held on February 28, 1909, in New York. It was organized by the Socialist Party of America in remembrance of the 1908 strike of the International Ladies Garment Worker's Union. Originally the day was called International

Working Women's Day, and is celebrated on March 8th in different regions of the world with the focus of the celebrations ranging from general celebration of respect, appreciation and love towards women for their economic, political and social achievements.
