Dear members, friends and supporters,

We wish all our readers a happy, healthy and peaceful New Year 5771!

September finds our community back to normal after the summer recess. All activities, classes and services are back on schedule.

As we look back we see that even with the summer schedule, our community life took little notice of vacation time. Beautiful Shabbat services were held, and many cultural activities also took place.

During one Shabbat weekend we had to say goodbye to our Abraham Geiger rabbinical student, Natascha Lyskovoy. Natascha's one-year internship had come to an end and as we celebrated Shabbat with her, we presented her with a gift of appreciation, "The Womens Haftarah Commentary." She was delighted! As a special "gift" to us, she brought her husband along, WUPJ Rabbi Sascha Lyskovoy from Moscow.



Our Saturday morning Torah study was doubly fascinating as members could choose between studying with Rabbi Sasha in Russian or with Natascha in German. We wish Natascha all the best in her further studies and hope to see her in Hamelin soon.



We enjoyed a cantorial concert with Mimi Sheffer on June 27th. Chassan Sheffer performed in "Haus der Kirche" in Hamelin. Unfortunately, concert attendance was lessened by the fact that the weather outside was unusually hot and steamy, and Germany was playing in the semi-finals of the World Soccer Cup. We were pleased, despite the heat and sports event, to receive a visit from the Jacob-Pins-Society and after a lecture in our congregation, the Society members joined us for the concert. An intimate but appreciative audience was captivated by Ms. Sheffers brilliant performance. Her program, "Chassanut 2010," included works from Yossele Rosenblatt, Meir Finkelstein, Louis Lewandowski, Eduard Birnbaum, Shlomo Ravitz, Max Yannowski, and Nurit Hirsch. Our congregation thankfully acknowledges the Central

Council of Jews of Germany for financing the concert for us.

On August 7th we were off to the neighboring town of Bad Münders to participate in this year's Cultural Festival. Besides an information booth, our groups "Shalom" and "Chag Sameach" performed Jewish music and Israeli dancing. We always feel this type of outreach helps tear down barriers and opens doors to dialogue, insuring a just and tolerant society.

The 16th annual conference of the UPJ was held July 8–11 in Berlin. This year's theme was "Liberal Judaism Today." Fascinating and informative workshops and seminars were offered by leaders and teachers from Germany and around the world. Moving services in Hebrew, German and Russian were also celebrated. New this year was a Music Festival, which ran parallel to the conference. Our synagogue choir, "Shalom," performed and did us all proud. An article in the *WUPJNews* appeared, which we will add here:

The [Union of Progressive Jews of Germany \(UPJ\)](#) held its 16th annual conference July 8–11 in Berlin-Spandau, attracting 277 participants, the highest number ever to attend. Keynote speakers included Dr. Jan Mühlstein, president of the UPJ; Leslie Bergman, president of the European Union for Progressive Judaism and a former World Union senior vice chair; Dr. David Breakstone, representing World Zionist Organization; and Rabbi Dr. Tovia Ben-Chorin, who, before



recently retiring, was spiritual leader of Or Chadash, the World Union affiliate in Zurich.

There were 24 workshops in German, Russian and English. Speakers and presenters came from Germany, Israel, the former Soviet Union, and South Africa. Among the topics were "Jewish-Muslim Dialogue," "Who is a Jew: Patrilineality in our communities," "Kosher & Co.: Food and Spirituality," "Judaism and the Ethical Considerations of Globalization," and "Youth Work in our Congregations."

"There was something for everyone," says Rachel Dohme, who heads up international relations for the UPJ, "and one often had the difficult choice of which workshop to attend."

According to Dohme, daily services, including Friday evening, Saturday morning and Havdalla, were well attended. "The spirituality of celebrating Shabbat in prayer and song with so many is a special facet of the annual meeting and is anticipated by many attendees," she says. "Of note was the Shabbat Shacharit service, competently and beautifully led by students from Abraham Geiger College," Germany's first post-war liberal rabbinic seminary.

Running parallel to the gathering was a music festival, which will become a regular element of the UPJ's annual conference. Attendees were able to attend cultural performances staged by members of movement congregations.

An annual membership meeting capped the conference, at which the UPJ accepted a proposal of standards for congregations. It was also decided that next year's conference will be held in Berlin-Spandau from July 7 to 10.

Ruth Cohen Honored

Ruth Cohen, a former president and now honorary president of the European Union for Progressive Judaism and a past president of the World Union, received the 2010 Israel Jacobson Prize in Berlin. The award, bestowed every two years by the Union of Progressive Jews of Germany, recognized Cohen for her contribution to the reestablishment of liberal Judaism in that country. The ceremony coincided with the 200th anniversary of the dedication of Israel Jacobson's temple in Seesen, Germany, recognized around the world as the birthplace of liberal Judaism, and was part of the festivities marking the bicentennial.

More than 50 rabbis and movement leaders from Israel, Great Britain and the US took part in the celebratory events.

Representing the World Union were Rabbi Andrew Goldstein, chairman of the EUPJ, and Leslie Bergman, its president.

“Mrs. Cohen was an enormous help in our effort to re-establish liberal Judaism in Germany,” said Dr. Jan Mühlstein, president of the UPJ, in presenting the award. “She took part in numerous official and unofficial meetings and discussions in her position as president of the EUPJ, and later as president of the WUPJ, making a strong case for religious pluralism in Germany. Pivotal was her meeting with former Central Council of Jews in Germany (Zentralrat) president Paul Spiegel and former minister of the interior Otto Schily. The meeting with Schily took place parallel to Pope Benedict XVI’s visit to the Orthodox synagogue of Cologne on August 19, 2005. This meeting opened the dialogue of acceptance of the liberal movement within the Central Council.” (WUPJNews)

Jewish September

Our congregation will celebrate the High Holy Days, beginning with Erev Rosh Hashana services on September 8th. We are pleased that Rabbi Ilana Baird from Haifa will join us for the “Days of Awe” for the fourth consecutive year.

Rosh Hashana celebrates the Jewish New Year and culminates with Yom Kippur, the holiest day of the year, ten days later. The ten days between New Year and the Day of Atonement offer each Jew time to seek forgiveness between himself and others and then between himself and God. This is achieved by threefold by

Erev Rosh Hashana services will begin on Wednesday, September 8th at 5:30 p.m. A communal meal will be offered after services. Besides the traditional apples and honey, we ask everyone to bring a vegetarian dish to share. Rosh Hashana morning services will continue the next morning at 10:00 a.m. We’ll enjoy a communal lunch and then observe the Tashlich ceremony riverside.

The Kol Nidre melody on Erev Yom Kippur on September 17th will open our hearts and stir our souls, preparing us for Yom Kippur prayers on Saturday, September 18th. After Yiskor and Ne’ila services we will break the fast together, spiritually refreshed and renewed for the New Year 5771.

Roof-Raising Celebration on Sukkot, Thursday, September 23rd!



Anyone who drives through the Bürenstrasse can see that our synagogue building is progressing by leaps and bounds. Our synagogue will be the first newly constructed Reform synagogue in post-war Germany.

We invite all our members, friends and supporters to join us on Sukkot, September 23rd at 11:00 a.m. in the Sukka in the Bürenstrasse, as Rabbi Irit Shillor celebrates Sukkot with us. After everyone has had a turn to shake the Lulav, we will go next door to our new synagogue and celebrate our “Roof Raising”—a German tradition at 12 noon. We will greet many local politicians, church leaders and representatives of local social and cultural organizations and raise our glasses to the wonder unfolding before our eyes and thanking God. The daunting symbolism of Sukkot, a holiday which reminds us of our wanderings and a roof-raising which establishes our spiritual home is absolutely awesome. Join us!

Jewish Culture in September

Our congregation will take part in a Jewish-Christian exhibit and ceremony on Sunday, September 12th in the St. Petri-Pauli Lutheran Church in Bad Münden. Rabbi Ilana Baird, Rachel Dohme and our synagogue choir, “Shalom” will participate. The theme is “The Ten Commandments”. Ten beautiful glass windows from glass artist, Werner Kothe will be on display. Rabbi Baird will read each of the Ten Commandments in Hebrew and Rachel Dohme will read the German translation.
